WHAT WE DO

StreetSmart SA is a registered fundraising organisation that supports partner organisations. These organisations assist marginalised children by giving them the support they need to lead viable lives.

What is StreetSmart's focus?

We believe children should have the opportunity to improve their lives. Our focus is therefore to fund projects that assist children at risk, to overcome obstacles and be successfully re-integrated into society. StreetSmart disbursements go to programmes that focus on elements of family reintegration, education and skills training.

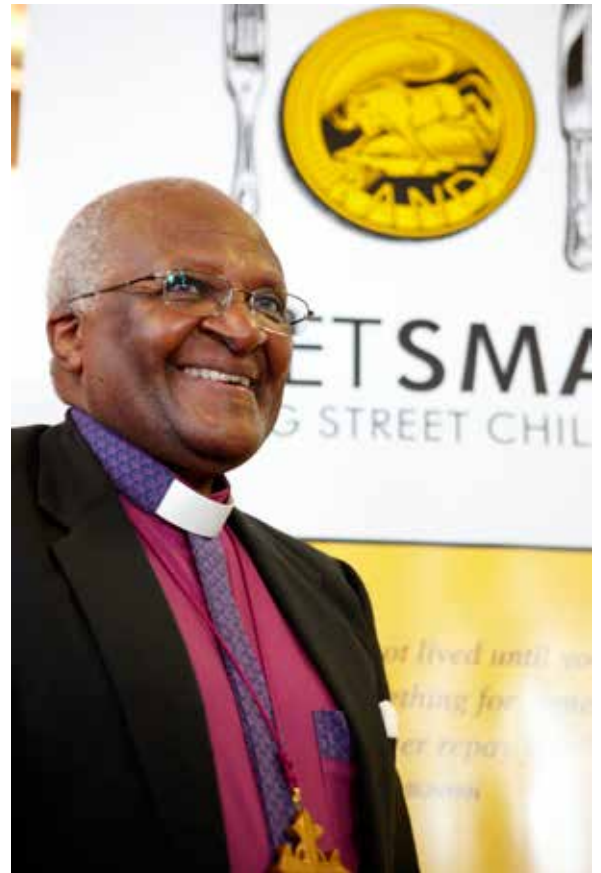
We actively encourage the public to give responsibly. **Giving money or gifts to a child on the street, keeps the child on the street.** Responsible giving would be to donate to organisations, like StreetSmart.

How do we use the StreetSmart funds to make a difference?

Vulnerable children and their families are at the core of what we do. The organisations and programmes we support, address the holistic needs of children, their families and communities.

How do we raise the funds?

StreetSmart restaurants display a StreetSmart table card, informing patrons that a voluntary R5 donation will be added to their bill. They have the option to give more than R5 or not give at all. This donation is registered separately in the restaurant till. Diners should see their StreetSmart donation reflected on their restaurant bill.

OPERATIONS - RESTAURANTS

StreetSmart's success lies in two elements: restaurants and corporate sponsorships. Conscientised restaurants join the initiative to help raise funds for marginalised children in their communities. Our mandate is to spend every cent donated in StreetSmart restaurants on street children programmes. We can only realise our goals if corporate sponsors partner with StreetSmart to take care of our operational expenses.

Our 2013 operational capacity was enhanced with the help of volunteers. Our thanks go to every volunteer who reacted to our call to assist.

The StreetSmart fundraising concept is established by the participation of restaurants. We want to thank each participating restaurant that continues to raise funds for StreetSmart and who keep motivating their staff to run the initiative effectively. They have raised R907,700 during 2013.

During 2013, StreetSmart's long awaited roll-out to Swellendam, Johannesburg and Pretoria materialised. StreetSmart is a community initiative, run by the community, for the community. In each of the towns/cities, a committee, of 3-5 members is responsible for maintaining and expanding the local StreetSmart chapter.

StreetSmart SA is operational in Cape Town, Franschhoek, Stellenbosch, Swellendam, Johannesburg and Pretoria, with single restaurants in Paarl, Helderberg, Oudtshoorn and Plettenberg Bay. The total number of participating restaurants at the end of 2013 was 81. For 2014 we anticipate officially launching in Plettenberg Bay, and hope to also launch in Oudtshoorn and Paarl, as well as re-establish Helderberg.

StreetSmart SA is supported internationally by Specktakel Restaurant in Haarlem, Kaatje bij de Sluis in Blokzijl, Holland, and the food supply company EBO van den Bor, which is raising funds in Belgium and Holland.

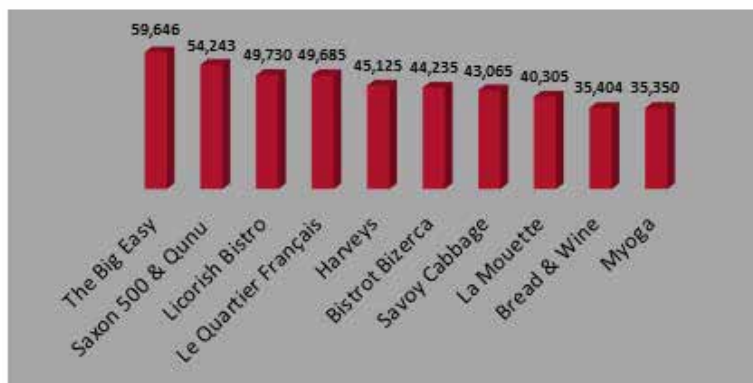

Once a year the StreetSmart Board call for proposals from carefully selected beneficiaries. After evaluation, grants are made. Each town/city raises funds for their own community projects that assist children at risk.

StreetSmart SA disbursements for 2013 amounted to R675,000 to 10 organisations.

I. Reporting on R675,000 disbursed to selected beneficiaries for 2013

While the stories contained in this report are true, the names and photographs have been changed in order to protect the children.

Cape Town Multi Service Centre (CTMSC) assists poverty stricken, at risk children and their families with guidance and assistance in self-development and self-reliance. CTMSC received R100,000 from **StreetSmart Cape Town** that was used towards the After School Care Programme at Klipfontein Primary School, Netreg.

For 2013 their focus was directed on Grade 3, 4 and 5 children, where 20 learners were identified with learning difficulties. The Family Reconstruction Worker and two After Care Teachers, not only provided family support directly linked to these learners, but also to the broader Netreg community.

A Good News Story from CTMSC

During the first semester, a Grade 5 learner had become emotionally withdrawn and uninterested in participating in any activities. When the Family reconstruction Worker interviewed him, it transpired that his parents had separated. He both missed and needed the attention of his father.

The Family Reconstruction Worker became involved with both parents, and proved to be an excellent mediator.

As a result of this intervention, the boy now enjoys quality time with his father. A highlight was on his birthday, when his father made a special effort – the first time in three years.

The ripple effect is that he is more participative in class activities and has improved in both English and Maths (previously his most difficult subjects). He is more outspoken and his general outlook on life is definitely more positive.



CTMSC After School Care Programme

Home from Home provides support and supervised foster care for orphaned, abandoned and vulnerable children in small family homes in their own communities. Each home has no more than six children in it, cared for by a Foster Mother or Foster Parents who are supported by a part-time assistant, under the overall guidance of a Social Worker.

StreetSmart Cape Town, awarded R100,000 to Home from Home for three foster homes in the Southern Suburbs: two homes in Vrygrond and one home in Ocean View. The funding was used towards the costs of providing social work support services such as family reunification, therapeutic interventions and social work supervision.

A Good News Story from *Home from Home*

The process of family reunification is slow. For some children, in order to take one step forward to family reunification with biological family members, it is necessary to take two steps back.

In one such instance, two of the boys from Ocean View had been scheduled to spend the holiday with their father. He had made wonderful progress towards having a safe and clean home environment, regular income and the necessary support available to look after the boys personally in the future. Having been with their father for a short period during

the holiday, the boys had to return to the home as he no longer had sufficient funds to support them for the holiday period. Whilst this was a very disheartening process for the boys, we were proud of the biological father for making a difficult decision, returning the boys to an environment where the resources are available for them to be looked after. Subsequently we were further encouraged at the steps that the biological father has taken to ensure financial stability in order to host the children for a longer period over the next holiday.



Home from Home in Stellenbosch received R100,000 from **StreetSmart Stellenbosch**, to provide services to three foster homes: two homes in Kayamandi and one home in Cloetesville. These funds enabled the provision of social work support and supervision services towards family reunification.

A Good News Story from *Home from Home*



Particularly joyful events in our homes in Kayamandi have been the reunification of three children with their biological family over the last year. Our social work team is instrumental in facilitating the lead up to the time of family reunification, both the preparation of the child in question and their foster family who have to prepare to bid them farewell.

While the parting is bitter sweet, we view a successful reunification as a positive event.

Family reunification of a slightly different nature took the form of the arrival of a new baby boy to one of our Kayamandi homes. Here he was reunited with his older brother, already in our care. The new addition to the home appears to have settled into the family with ease.

STREETSMART DELIVERS

Learn to Live at Salesian Institute teaches Technical Skills to young learners from the various shelters in and around Cape Town or directly off the street. Learn to Live has also made some changes in order to comply with Department of Education requirements. School hours have been lengthened and learners now, in addition to their Skills Training, receive academic classes. This new curriculum assists the youth to enter the WCED career routing (with recognised certificates). It also allows them to extend further into SETA training and FET College training, should they so wish.

Learn to Live received R100,000 from **StreetSmart Cape Town** to use towards a Panelbeating Instructor's salary, materials and tools for the workshop and transport for the youth attending the workshop. As many as 32 youth completed their training in panelbeating and spraypainting skills, with over 40% confirmed to be successfully employed. All youth attended ABET classes. They have their own CV, ID document and a certificate in job application and interviewing skills.

A Good News Story from *Learn to Live*

"It first started when I heard about the free opportunity to learn panel beating. I was surprised that such a course was free because normally at the other learning places always charge a fee. So I wanted to join earlier the year but it was full and I lost interest in the programme and the waiting list was too long. Two months later I phoned again and I was told that I can come in and start the course.

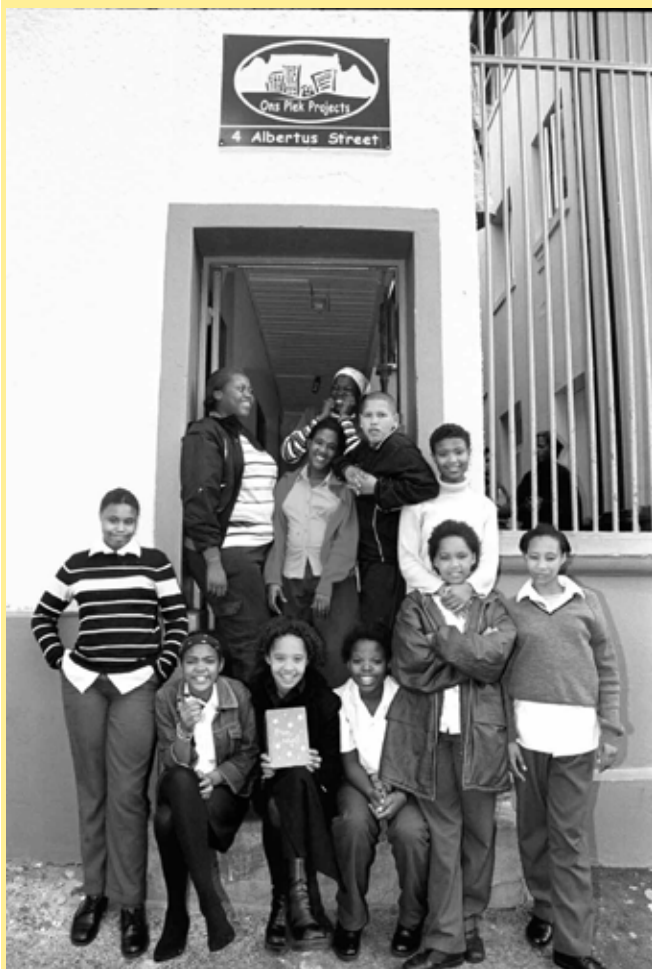
I was quite excited to learn after being out of school for a year. On the first day I already started learning how to repair a dent I thought that I would at least

take a few weeks to learn but our sir, Mr Rodney, trained us all easily. Before joining the programme I did not have a vision for my future but now I am starting to pick my pieces of life and put them together. I can see that my class mates are having the same mind set because we are doing life skills at the same time so we are sharing ideas. I would like to say thank you to Learn to Live for giving me this opportunity because without this I do not know what I would be doing with myself."

STREETSMART DELIVERS

Ons Plek provides comprehensive assessment and development services for street girls with the aim of facilitating family reunification and community reintegration. It also has preventative programmes for children at risk in the Philippi community. **StreetSmart Cape Town**, provided Ons Plek with a R100,000 disbursement towards the salary for the Social Worker, skills training materials and transport costs to allow the girls to visit their families and relatives.

A Good News Story from *Ons Plek*



Ons Plek projects for street girls

After her mother died, one girl was kept in a pigsty in rural Transkei for many months by her Aunt. When she came to Ons Plek she displayed very disturbed behaviour. She did not understand how to live with others and was very excitable, running around screaming at inappropriate moments. Almost daily, she cried for many hours, clutching a photograph of her mother, which we obtained to help her deal with her grief. Her Mother had died several years previously and we hoped that our social work support in grieving would help her to move forward emotionally.

Almost a year passed at Ons Plek, with very little change and we began to think she may need chemical intervention. However two

months into the next year, she gradually, calmed down. When she did cry, it was no longer for hours. The incidents which sparked the crying also diminished as a result of the twice-weekly sessions with the social worker which helped her to learn how to deal with interactions with the other girls.

On occasion whilst she visited her Grandmother for a day she was invited to a house by a man who kept her captive for four days. She escaped and returned to us. We expected a regression to her previous behaviour. Instead she continued to progressively become calmer and several months later she had improved so much that she could be moved to Siviwe to attend a formal remedial school.

Nceduluntu Sanctuary Trust provided residential care and Educare for disabled and able-bodied children. Some of these children are HIV+ and some of them are AIDS orphans. All of them have been abused, neglected and/or abandoned by their parents. Nceduluntu Sanctuary Trust received R25,000 from **StreetSmart Helderberg** to be used towards a salary for a Child Caregiver.

STREETSMART DELIVERS

The Kusasa Project offers educational opportunities to disadvantaged children from an informal settlement near Franschoek. By offering education, life skills and sporting activities, the Kusasa staff teach the children that there are opportunities in life and that there can be a brighter future.

The Kusasa Project received R50,000 from **StreetSmart Franschoek** towards the salary of a part time Social Worker.

A Good News Story from *The Kusasa Project*

Despite coming from a disturbed and traumatic background Godfrey (not his real name) actually showed some academic promise, yet over a two year period he failed to flourish. Disruptive bad behaviour showed that Godfrey tested positive for drugs but he declined the rehab arrangement and was therefore removed from the Scholarship Program.

However after a few months Godfrey asked for the opportunity to prove himself and went back to school. He is performing academically and still manages to produce sound results. Hopefully we will secure placement in the rehab facility to further fuel his resolve. This time round he is refusing to give up and is determined to help us help him.



The Kusasa Project offering educational opportunities

YEA - Youth Empowerment Action works to promote family reconstruction and preservation. They thereby prevent children from moving onto the streets. In the Aftercare facility children are kept constructively busy with activities which serve as preventative measures. The children learn to build strong relationships with caring adults. YEA received R100,000 from **StreetSmart Franschoek** towards the salary for the Social Worker and life skills education training materials.

YEA aftercare programmes

YEA implemented a structure to prevent children from becoming street children and worked in collaboration with final year psychology students from UCT. The psychology students made an assessment of each child, and their families. After the evaluation was done, the

family was supported with a counselling session.

The outcome of the psychological support was very rewarding. Eight children benefited with one child deciding to return to school, after an absence of three years.

The StreetSmart Mission

“To raise funds for curative and preventative programmes either for children on the street or those who are vulnerable and at risk of becoming street children.”

II. Disbursement allocations from funds collected in 2013

Our Annual Handover Event was always the highlight of our year, and this year we had three!



2013 Handover Event for Cape Town, Franschhoek and Stellenbosch

In 2013 a total amount of R907,700 was allocated for disbursement to beneficiaries and services to street children and children at risk. The selected projects for 2014 are:

StreetSmart Cape Town (est. 2005):

- Cape Town Multi Service Centre: R120,000 towards two aftercare teachers' salaries, a family reconstruction worker salary, transport costs and workshops for parents.

StreetSmart Stellenbosch (est. 2010):

- Home from Home: Kayamandi & Cloeteville: R160,000 towards social worker partial salary, transport, communication costs and family reunification services.

StreetSmart Swellendam (est. 2013):

- The Cooper Street Project: R40,000 towards school uniforms, educational equipment and materials.

StreetSmart Johannesburg (est. 2013):

- Twilight Children: R80,000 towards a family reconstruction worker salary.

Report of the Independent Auditors

To the members of StreetSmart Homeless Children's Charity South Africa

We have audited the accompanying annual financial statements of StreetSmart Homeless Children's Charity South Africa, which comprise the statement of financial position as at 31 December 2013, the statement of comprehensive income, the statement of changes in equity, the statement of cash flows for the year then ended, a summary of significant accounting policies and other explanatory notes, as set out on pages 7 to 13.

Directors' Responsibility for the Financial Statements

The company's directors are responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of these annual financial statements in accordance with International Financial Reporting Standards, and in the manner required by the Companies Act of South Africa. This responsibility includes: designing, implementing and maintaining internal control relevant to the preparation and fair presentation of annual financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error; selecting and applying appropriate accounting policies; and making accounting estimates that are reasonable in the circumstances.

Auditors' Responsibility

Our responsibility is to express an opinion on these annual financial statements based on our audit. We conducted our audit in accordance with International Standards on Auditing. Those standards require that we comply with ethical requirements and plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance whether the annual financial statements are free from material misstatement.

An audit involves performing procedures to obtain audit evidence about the amounts and disclosures in the annual financial statements. The procedures selected depend on the auditors' judgement, including the assessment of the risks of material misstatement of the annual financial statements, whether due to fraud or error. In making those risk assessments, the auditors considers internal control relevant to the entity's preparation and fair presentation of the annual financial statements in order to design audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of the entity's internal control. An audit also includes evaluating the appropriateness of accounting policies used and the reasonableness of accounting estimates made by the directors, as well as evaluating the overall presentation of the annual financial statements.

We believe that the audit evidence we have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our audit opinion.

Qualification

In common with similar organisations, it is not feasible for the organisation to institute accounting controls over cash collections from donations prior to initial entry of the collections and bequests in the accounting records. Accordingly, it was impracticable for us to extend our examination beyond the receipts actually recorded.

Qualified Opinion

In our opinion, except for the effects of the matter described in the preceding paragraph, the annual financial statements present fairly, in all material respects the financial position of company as of 31 December 2012, and of its financial performance and its cash flows for the year then ended in accordance with International Financial Reporting Standards.

Supplementary Information

The supplementary information set out on page 14 does not form part of the annual financial statements and is presented as additional information. We have not audited this information and accordingly do not express an opinion thereon.

FINANCIAL SUMMARY

In 2013, StreetSmart raised a grand total of R 1,575,138 comprising of donations, fundraisers and administration funds. Since inception in June 2005, StreetSmart SA has raised R7,144,466.

The sharp upward income curve for 2013 can be contributed to two factors: firstly, the national expansion of StreetSmart to Swellendam, Johannesburg and Pretoria, and secondly, a marked increase from 2012, in private donations.

In line with the growth pattern of the organisation, StreetSmart restaurants are still the biggest source of income.

Fundraisers during 2013 comprised of two screenings of the movie, The Way in collaboration with The Labia on Orange and our third annual Christmas raffle. Fundraisers:

1. Belinda Rattray and Dick Seamer, Safari Sun Ltd, held a golf day in Kent, UK
2. Showcook - Inter Hotel Challenge
3. Grant Thornton Cape
4. Winchester Mansions Hotel in Sea Point, who held an auction of Storm Thorgenson's art work.

We received good support for our Christmas Raffle, in donations of prizes and the purchase of tickets. R80,000 was raised. **Our heart-felt thanks to every supporter.**

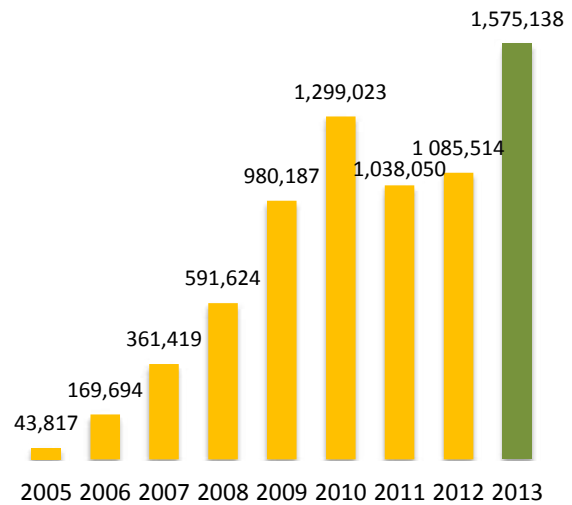

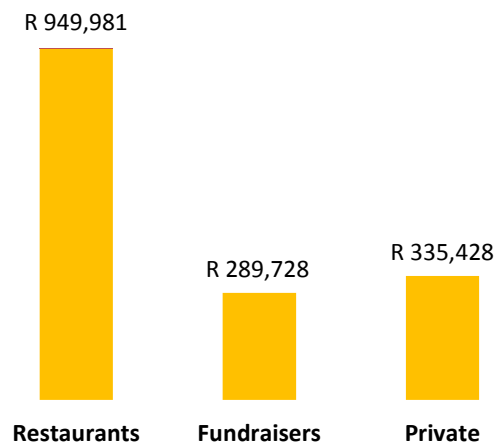
StreetSmart's accumulative disbursements since 2006 are R4,584,344. Steady growth peaked in 2010, when a dedicated R500,000 donation was received from the Rupert Foundation.

In 2012 we saw a R25,000 drop in available funds for disbursement due to Helderberg restaurants leaving StreetSmart. The 34% increase from 2012 is due to StreetSmart expansion into Gauteng and the Southern Cape.

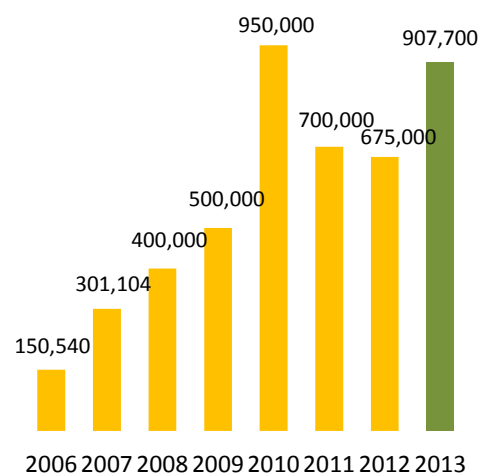
TOTAL DONATIONS INCOME COMPARISON PER ANNUM
