StreetSmart SA is a registered fundraising organisation that supports partner organisations. These organisations assist marginalised children by giving them the support they need to lead viable lives.

What is StreetSmart's focus?

We believe children should have the opportunity to improve their lives. Our focus is therefore to fund projects that assist children at risk, to overcome obstacles and be successfully re-integrated into society. StreetSmart disbursements go to programmes that focus on elements of family reintegration, education and skills training.

We actively encourage the public to give responsibly. Giving money or gifts to a child on the street, keeps the child on the street. Responsible giving would be to donate to organisations, like StreetSmart.

How do we use the StreetSmart funds to make a difference?

Vulnerable children and their families are at the core of what we do. The organisations and programmes we support address the holistic needs of children, their families and communities.

How do we raise the funds?

StreetSmart restaurants display a StreetSmart table card, informing patrons that a voluntary R5 donation will be added to their bill. They have the option to give more than R5 or not give at all. This donation is registered separately in the restaurant till. Diners should see their StreetSmart donation reflected on their restaurant bill.

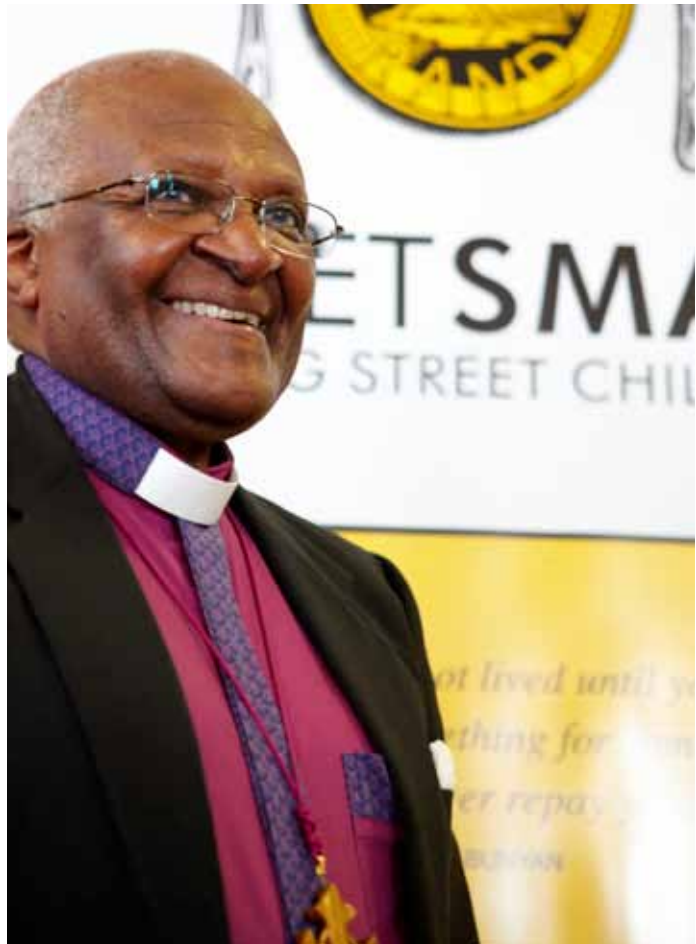
What makes StreetSmart unique?

OPERATIONS - RESTAURANTS

We want to thank each participating restaurant that continues to raise funds for StreetSmart and keeps motivating their staff to run the initiative effectively. Their efforts show in the successful raising of R675,000 which goes to organisations helping vulnerable children.

StreetSmart restaurants give their diners the opportunity to give responsibly. StreetSmart SA is also supported internationally by Spektakel Restaurant in Haarlem, Holland, and the food supply company EBO van den Bor, which is raising funds in Belgium and Holland.

StreetSmart SA is operational in Cape Town, Franschhoek, Stellenbosch and Helderberg, with single restaurants in Johannesburg, Paarl and Bloemfontein. The total number of participating restaurants at the end of 2012 was 56.

During the latter half of 2012, discussions and plans were underway to start StreetSmart Swellendam and Johannesburg early in 2013. This is following through on the Board's vision to extend StreetSmart's reach to help vulnerable children nationally.

During the winter of 2012, we held the StreetSmart Soup Season in participating StreetSmart restaurants. The aim of the project was to thank and promote StreetSmart restaurants and to raise awareness of the StreetSmart campaign to give responsibly. Our PR sponsor, GC Communications, excelled in getting exposure for StreetSmart, Restaurants and the Soup Season.

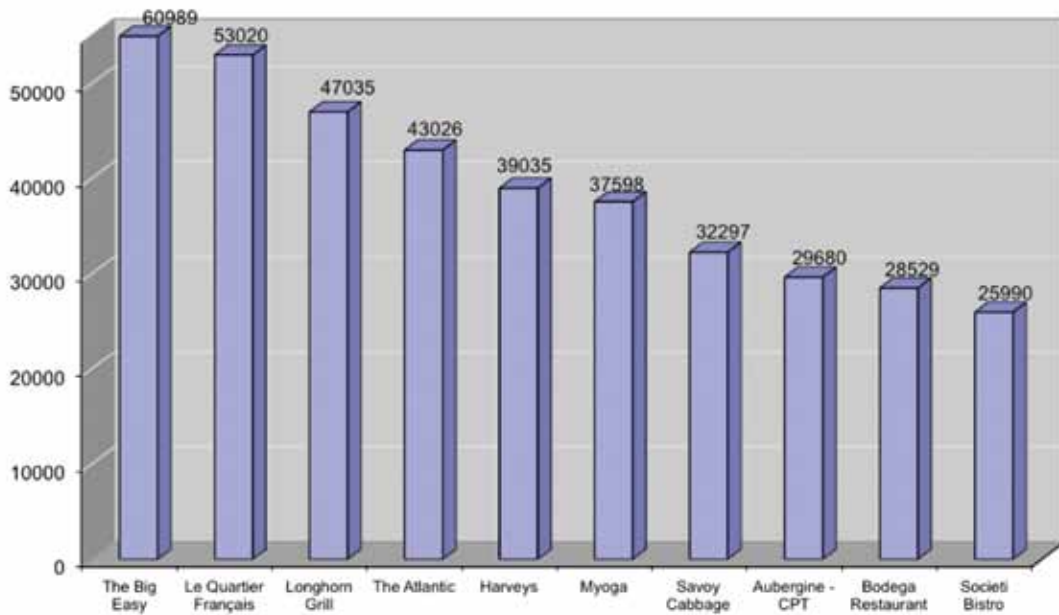

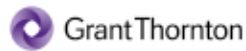

Once a year the StreetSmart Board calls for proposals from selected beneficiaries. After evaluation, grants are made. Each town or city raises funds for their own community projects. StreetSmart grants to beneficiaries for 2012 amounted to R700,000 and were awarded to 10 projects working with street children and children at risk.

I. Reporting on R700,000 disbursed to selected beneficiaries for 2012

Cape Town Multi Service Centre (CTMSC)

assists street children and their families to participate in their own development by making services accessible, available and affordable for vulnerable families in the communities who are affected by poverty. CTMSC received R100,000 from StreetSmart Cape Town that was used towards their After School Care Programme at the Klipfontein Primary School, Netreg. This programme concentrated on the twenty Grade 1 learners that failed their first school year. CTMSC employed a Family Reconstruction Worker and two After Care Teachers for a period of 12 months to work with these vulnerable families and children in the Netreg communities.

A Good News Story from Cape Town Multi Service Centre

As Social Worker, I regularly visit the StreetSmart – Klipfontein Primary School Aftercare Programme. On one such visit in May 2012, I spend some time in the “class room” with the Grade one learners.

At one point I spent approximately five minutes with a child, helping him to correctly form his letters. I could see that he enjoyed the attention and encouragement. I subsequently moved to another table where four Grade one learners were practising their letters.

After spending about four minutes at this table, somebody pulled on my shirt and said: “Kom kyk hierso.” [Come look here.] I realised that it was the same boy that I assisted approximately six minutes ago with his letters. When I got to his table I could see that the little boy was extremely proud of his attempts. He was so proud that he deemed it necessary to stand up from his chair, walk three metres to where I was standing, pull on my shirt and made sure I come and observe his attempts.

The smile on that little boy’s face will remain with me, (an experienced Social Worker for twenty two years), for a long time. The smile said: “I am happy, I am gaining confidence through the recognition, encouragement and achievement.”

Home from Home provides supported and supervised foster care for orphaned, abandoned and vulnerable children in small family homes in their own communities. Each home ideally has no more than six children in it, cared for by a Foster Mother or Foster Parents and supported by a part-time assistant, under the overall guidance of a social worker.

StreetSmart in Cape Town, awarded R100,000 to Home from Home for three foster homes in the Southern Suburbs: two homes in Vrygrond and one home in Ocean View. The funding was used towards the costs of providing social work support services such as family reunification, therapeutic interventions and social work supervision.

Home from Home in Stellenbosch received R100,000 from StreetSmart Stellenbosch to provide services to three foster homes: two homes in Kayamandi and one home in Cloeteville. These funds enabled the provision of providing social work support and supervision services.

A Good News Story from Home from Home

A real success has been that of Fiona –the oldest child in Daphne’s house. Now in Grade 7, she was singled out to receive a scholarship from the Kay Mason Foundation for high school. Part of the conditions of this scholarship was attendance at a Saturday School enrichment program throughout the year. Funding from StreetSmart enabled her to attend this enrichment program. Fiona has been granted a place at South Peninsula High, where she will start in January 2013. This is a real achievement that we are all very proud of!

Fiona is a reader with a voracious appetite for books, and has set up her own library at home. We make sure that we get her a wide range of age appropriate books which have been donated to us. Fiona’s reading and home library seems to be encouraging other children in the home to read more.

Learn to Live at Salesian Institute runs Educational programmes in basic education and Technical Skills workshops for children and youth from the various shelters in and around Cape Town or directly off the street. Learn to Live received R100,000 from StreetSmart Cape Town that was used towards the Panel-beating Instructor’s salary, materials and tools for the workshop and transport for the youth attending the workshop. Apart from the technical panelbeating and spraypainting skills, 30 youth also received Life Skills, rules of the workshop, safety in the workshop and the correct use of different tools training. In addition, at least 15 youth attended ABET classes. At the end of the year 20 youth graduated from the two panelbeating courses presented by Learn to Live.

All youth will have their own CV, ID document and a certificate with application and interview skills.

“One of the trainees went to work at a furniture factory, spray painting furniture and his employer phoned to inform me how happy he is with him.” (Rodney Abrahamse – Trainer)

“When I came to Learn to Live they learn me more than just work. Lessons of life my first days at school it was hard I was about to give up so I thought to myself this is a benefit for me and thanks to my sir. I am a better person today and I am going to achieve my goals.” (Altaaf Armien)

Ons Plek provides comprehensive assessment and developmental services for street girls with the aim of facilitating family reunification and community reintegration. It also has preventative programmes for children at risk in the Philippi community. Ons Plek received R100,000 from StreetSmart Cape Town to fund a Social Worker salary, skills training materials and transport for the girls to visit family and relatives over weekends and holidays.

A Good News Story from Ons Plek

Miranda (not her real name) is a child who was used to defying her father's authority and doing as she pleases. This led to constant fights with her father which ended up turning into physical violence. Miranda is 15 and liked to think of herself as an independent young woman. After being placed at Ons Plek early this year she showed the same cheeky behaviour and looking down upon others. She accused her father of physically abusing her and played the victim. She displayed a lot of anger and aggression towards her father and blamed him for being in children's home.

Development Report

Miranda ran away with some of the girls she had befriended and spent some time with boys around the Cape Town area. She showed no regard for adult authority and clearly showed disrespect by either walking away when spoken to or ignoring. She also used manipulative techniques to get her way. On one incident she scratched her arms with a sharp object and threatened to harm herself. In counselling it slowly came out that the anger she displayed was due to the fact that she had never dealt with the death of her biological mother. Upon reflection she admitted she had never forgiven her father who also used to abuse her mother physically before she died. The child began to open up and start facing her issues for the first time.

Before being placed at Ons Plek she had been suspended from school due to rude behaviour towards the teachers. At Ons Plek, Miranda started working in our informal school to prove that she could do better and behave better. She wanted to return to school. The one time she ran away in her first unstable month was the last time. She worked hard at controlling her anger with guidance. When she got angry she would take some time to calm down, read a book and speak about it later. This worked well for her.

She showed such great improvement that she soon returned back to her school and at present is doing very well. Her relationship with her father still needs some work. Family reunification is a definite option and both parties are working hard to ensure it happens. Miranda is learning life skills and respect for elders. When she goes home for weekends she practices what she learns. She is happy to stay at Ons Plek for a further period whilst the family works together on their issues.

The Kusasa Project offers educational opportunities to vulnerable children from the informal settlement outside Franschhoek. Their goal is to encourage the children to a brighter future beyond the shacks and poverty, by facilitating academic, sporting and life skills development. The Kusasa Project received R50,000 from StreetSmart Franschhoek towards a social worker's salary.

A Good News Story from The Kusasa Project

Sikelela (not his real name) has been one of the children on our intervention program this year. He has had a tragic childhood whereby he lost both his parents when he was a very young boy. His mother abandoned him and ran away with her boyfriend to the Eastern Cape. During her absence Sikelela and his father and two older brothers were left to fend for themselves. Sikelela was taken on by The Kusasa Project at this time as a little boy with enormous potential but contending with very difficult home circumstances.

Sikelela's father became very ill – he thought that it was due to his mother's absence but it was later established that he was suffering from an AIDS related illness. And then the news filtered through that Sikelela's mother had been shot dead in an argument with her boyfriend and that this little boy would never see his mother again.

Sikelela now had no one – in his young life he had lost both his mother and his father and his brothers were not capable of giving him the nurturing and the love that he so desperately needed.

He has championed on regardless, but it has taken its toll and his teenage years have seen the deep seated hurt of these childhood years manifest as violent aggression. One day we were called into Franschhoek High as he had taken his belt off and severely beaten another girl for not giving him the money she owed him for a bus ticket. This was a turning point for both Sikelela and for the way we were to manage him going forward.

He came to study in the afternoon very remorseful and contrite having been spoken to by a disciplinary committee at school. It was then that he confessed that his anger was out of control - that when he was provoked he could not prevent what he did as he felt something well up inside him that drove him forward and was unstoppable.

Through the initial intervention of the social workers and the regular intervention of a clinical psychologist, we hope that we can help Sikelela through these turbulent teenage years. With his help, we can set him on a path whereby he learns how to manage his own feelings and control his over reaction and vicious temper.

YEA - Youth Empowerment Action

works to empower the youth of the Franschhoek valley by reintegrating them back into their families, schools and community. YEA received R100,000 from StreetSmart Franschhoek to be used towards a social worker salary, life skills facilitation and materials, as well as transport costs for the children and facilitators to life skills workshops, educational trips and school holiday programmes.

A Good News Story from YEA

One 9 year old child, were reported to the organisation, after wandering in the streets and not attending school. The child's mother worked and was unaware of the child's actions. Successful therapeutic intervention from the organisation, led to the child being placed in her grandmother's care. Discussions between the social worker and teacher in supporting the child on an educational level, brought change to the child's school results. As part of the monitoring and evaluation process, the child were integrated within YEA's developmental programs, such as the aftercare homework group, with noticeable results.

Nceduluntu Sanctuary Trust provides residential care and Educare for disabled and able-bodied children. Some of these children are HIV+ and some of them are AIDS orphans. All of them have been abused, neglected and/or abandoned by their parents. Nceduluntu Sanctuary Trust received R50,000 from StreetSmart Helderberg to be used towards a salary for an Educare Centre Supervisor. After consultation with the StreetSmart Board, this appointment was cancelled (due to unforeseen problems arising with the registration of the Educare Centre), and changed to funding the employment of a part-time Social Worker with effect from 1 July 2012.

II. Disbursement allocations from funds collected in 2012

In 2012 a total amount of R675,000 was allocated for disbursement to beneficiaries and services to street children and children at risk. The selected projects for 2013 are:

StreetSmart Cape Town (est. 2005):

- Cape Town Multi Service Centre: R100,000 towards aftercare teachers' salaries, family reconstruction worker salary, transport costs and fares for home visits.
- Home from Home: Oceanview & Vrygrond each R50,000 towards a social worker partial salary, transport and communication costs and family reunification services.
- Learn to Live: R100,000 towards panelbeating workshop skills training: a panelbeating instructor salary, materials & tools for the workshop and fares for the youth to attend.
- Ons Plek: R100,000 towards social worker salary; skills training materials; fares for home visits.

StreetSmart Franschhoek (est. 2007):

- The Kusasa Project: R50,000 towards two part-time social worker salaries, and a community worker salary.
- Youth Empowerment Action: R100,000 towards social worker salary and life skills education training materials.

Stellenbosch StreetSmart (est. 2010):

- Home from Home: Kayamandi & Cloeteville each R50,000 towards social worker partial salary, transport and communication costs and family reunification services.

Helderberg StreetSmart (est. 2010):

- Nceduluntu Sanctuary Trust: R25,000 towards a child caregiver salary.

The StreetSmart Mission

“To raise funds for curative and preventative programmes either for children on the street or those who are vulnerable and at risk of becoming street children.”

Recipients of StreetSmart 2012 funds will be required to submit a report by the 31st August 2013 on how the funds were utilized. The Board of StreetSmart will assess whether the expenditure is in line with the approved proposals.

The Board has requested that these funds be ring-fenced in beneficiaries' audited accounts.

REPORT OF THE INDEPENDENT AUDITORS

To the members of StreetSmart Homeless Children's Charity South Africa

We have audited the accompanying annual financial statements of StreetSmart Homeless Children's Charity South Africa, which comprise the statement of financial position as at 31 December 2012, the statement of comprehensive income, the statement of changes in equity, the statement of cash flows for the year then ended, a summary of significant accounting policies and other explanatory notes, as set out on pages 7 to 13.

Directors' Responsibility for the Financial Statements

The company's directors are responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of these annual financial statements in accordance with International Financial Reporting Standards, and in the manner required by the Companies Act of South Africa. This responsibility includes: designing, implementing and maintaining internal control relevant to the preparation and fair presentation of annual financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error; selecting and applying appropriate accounting policies; and making accounting estimates that are reasonable in the circumstances.

Auditors' Responsibility

Our responsibility is to express an opinion on these annual financial statements based on our audit. We conducted our audit in accordance with International Standards on Auditing. Those standards require that we comply with ethical requirements and plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance whether the annual financial statements are free from material misstatement.

An audit involves performing procedures to obtain audit evidence about the amounts and disclosures in the annual financial statements. The procedures selected depend on the auditors' judgement, including the assessment of the risks of material misstatement of the annual financial statements, whether due to fraud or error. In making those risk assessments, the auditors' considers internal control relevant to the entity's preparation and fair presentation of the annual financial statements in order to design audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances, but not for the

purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of the entity's internal control. An audit also includes evaluating the appropriateness of accounting policies used and the reasonableness of accounting estimates made by the directors, as well as evaluating the overall presentation of the annual financial statements.

We believe that the audit evidence we have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our audit opinion.

Qualification

In common with similar organisations, it is not feasible for the organisation to institute accounting controls over cash collections from donations prior to initial entry of the collections and bequests in the accounting records. Accordingly, it was impracticable for us to extend our examination beyond the receipts actually recorded.

Qualified Opinion

In our opinion, except for the effects of the matter described in the preceding paragraph, the annual financial statements present fairly, in all material respects the financial position of company as of 31 December 2012, and of its financial performance and its cash flows for the year then ended in accordance with International Financial Reporting Standards.

Supplementary Information

The supplementary information set out on page 14 does not form part of the annual financial statements and is presented as additional information. We have not audited this information and accordingly do not express an opinion thereon.

FINANCIAL SUMMARY

Over the past year, StreetSmart raised a grand total of R1,085,512 comprising of donations, fundraisers and administration funds. The graph on the right depicts the income growth since the launch of StreetSmart SA in 2005. A combined total of R5,569,327 was raised over this period.

As expected, StreetSmart restaurants are still the biggest source of income. During 2012 we organised eight fundraisers for administration funds: one raffle and 7 screenings of the movie, *The Way* in collaboration with The Confraternity of St James and The Labia, as well as at The Screen Room at Le Quartier Français.

We would like to make special mention of the support received from raffle prize donors who so willingly donated prizes for the Christmas Raffle. Thanks to all supporters who purchased tickets. R62,100 was raised.

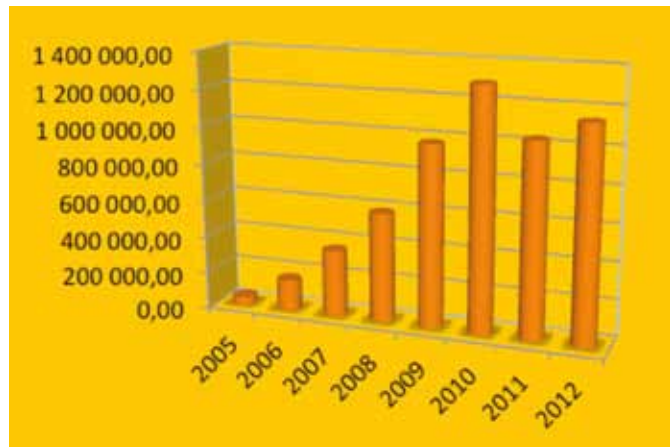

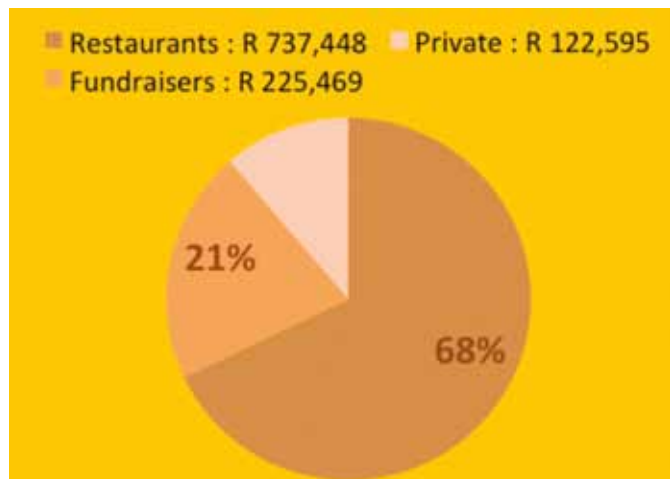

Our heartfelt thanks also goes to Wellington's Foods, who hosted a very successful and entertaining Heritage Braai Day for some children from StreetSmart beneficiary projects.

StreetSmart's accumulative disbursements since 2006 are R3,676,644. Steady growth peaked in 2010, when a dedicated R500,000 donation was received from the Rupert Foundation to assist StreetSmart's work. In 2012 we saw a R25,000 drop in available funds for disbursement due to Helderberg restaurants closing or leaving StreetSmart.

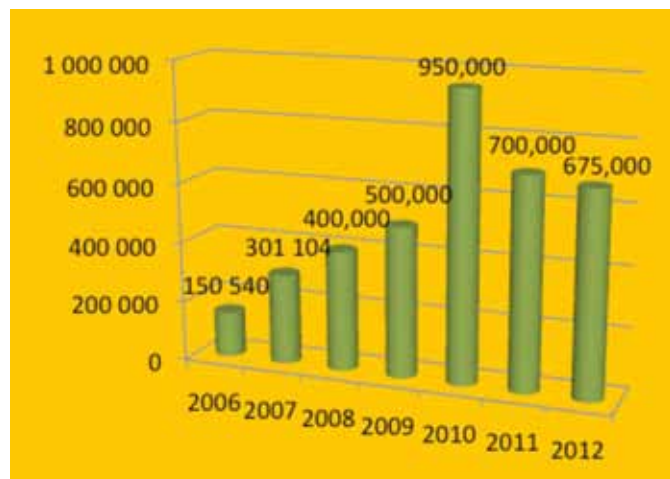
TOTAL DONATIONS INCOME COMPARISON PER ANNUM
